BIRDS TO TICK OFF YOUR BIRDWATCHERS LIST

Look up in the trees and you'll soon see why birdwatchers, affectionately known as twitchers are "flocking" to Tropical North Queensland. Twitchers (who are easy to spot – usually with binoculars slung around their necks and wearing shades of khaki) come here to try tick some of the 450 bird species that inhabit the region off their list. 13 of these delightful flutterers are endemic to North Queensland. To give yourself the best chance of spotting these birds you'll need to head to higher altitude rainforests in the Atherton Tablelands.

The Wet Tropics endemic species are:

- Lesser Setty Owl
- Tooth-billed Bowerbird
- Golden Bowerbird
- Fernwren
- Atherton Scrubwren
- Mountain thornbill
- Bridled Honeyeater
- Macleay's Honeyeater
- Chowchilla
- Bower's Strike-Thrush
- Pied Monarch
- Victoria's Riflebird
- Grey-headed Robin

No matter the time of year there are always birds to see. From October to April migrant species such as Buff-breasted paradise Kingfisher, Channel-billed Cuckoo and the Eastern Koel arrive from Papua New Guinea. Others, like the Noisy Pitta are breeding at this time and are easier to observe as they hunt for food.



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From May to September keep an eye out for Victoria's Reiflebird and winter breeders such as White-eared Monarch. The Daintree rainforest, Cairns foreshore, Cattana Wetlands and Mareeba Wetlands are all good spots to settle down and watch the birdlife.

Check out the photos below for some of the birds you'll likely spot and make a plan to visit one of the many wildlife, rainforest or nature parks for fabulous bird watching opportunities. Some even have accommodation in the forest so you can wake up with the birds!


